### On William Blake's Jerusalem

From a historical point of view, Blake's poem is about the conflict between nature and industrialisation. Blake's life coincides with the height of the First Industrial Revolution, and as the birthplace of said revolution, England is going through a stage where its citizens go from living on mainly rural areas to living in cities to work in factories. However, as much as his love for his country, Blake finds it hard to accept his new home country which is not covered in grass and nature as it has been before, but in fog and smoke from all the industrial activities. His romanticism causes him to write this poem as a call for help for the scenery of England, to go back to pre-Industrial-Revolution era which is full of nature. Evidence of this romantic element can be seen in "England's mountains green", "England's pleasant pastures", "England's green and pleasant land". The repetition of the word "pleasant" describes Blake's love 1

whether it really is nonourable for soluters to the in a war. As a solidier in one of the most infamous and bloodiest wars in history, Owen has first-hand experience of how terrifying the reality of war is. He describes wars in its realest state throughout his poem, for example writing "The ecstasy of fumbling" and "Fumbling the clumsy helmets just in time". He describes even these minor things in detail, giving the impression that war is truly horrifying on all sides, and every minute you might encounter death. Therefore, both poems have points that are right and wrong, dying for your country while serving in the army is indeed honourable according to Horace, and might even be an escape from the horrors of war; while Owen, as a solider
