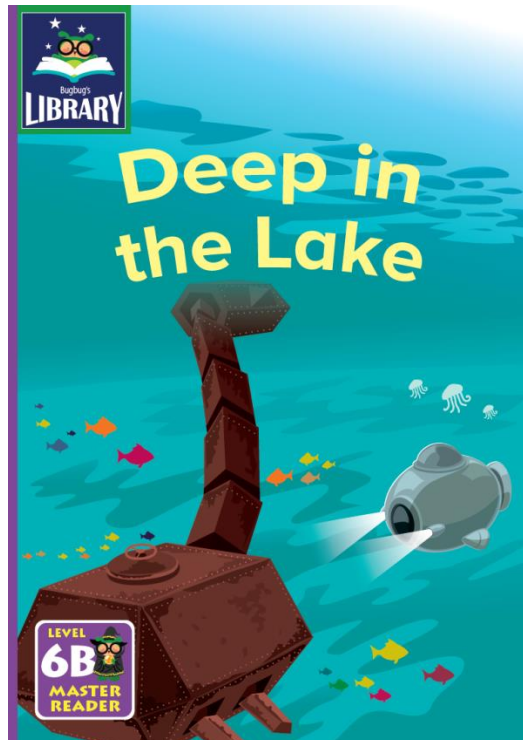

We write personal descriptions to write about what people look like. We might also describe the appearance of an interesting animal or even a monster.

One type of personal description is a character description. In these descriptions, we can use similes to describe a character's likes and dislikes, appearance and abilities.

Similes help the reader to picture a character clearly, and they also make our writing more unusual and interesting.

When we write similes, we use **as** or **like** to compare two things that are similar, for example:

He was **as** huge **as** a mountain.

He was **like** a huge mountain.

**The Loch Ness Monster**

The Loch Ness Monster is also known as Nessie. It is a creature believed to be living in Loch Ness, a large, deep loch in the Scottish Highlands.

Most scientists believe that the Loch Ness Monster does not really exist. They say that many of the so-called evidence of the monster's existence are either hoaxes or pictures of other animals. However, other people argue that Nessie is a plesiosaur, an extinct meat-eating reptile that lived in the Mesozoic era. The Loch Ness Monster has also been described as an elephant, an eel and other animals.

One of the most notorious hoaxes about Nessie is a photograph supposedly taken by Robert Kenneth Wilson, who was a doctor. Wilson claimed that he was looking at the loch when he saw the monster, so he grabbed his camera and took the photo. The photo showed a blurry image of a creature with a long neck and a tiny head. The photo attracted a lot of attention. However, the photo was later revealed to be a hoax. It was actually a toy submarine in the photo!



	Red Hat	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Expressing emotions and feelings
	Yellow Hat	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Thinking positively and finding out the benefits • Giving logical reasons
	Green Hat	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Using creativity to find new solutions and alternatives
