

Task 2: Questions

Answer in full sentences unless directed to do otherwise. The marks at the end of each question are a guide as to how much you should write. Detailed answers will be rewarded.

HINT: The number of marks for each question can guide you as to how much you should write and how many details to include. For example, Question 3 asks you to explain the narrator's action and it is worth 2 marks. So, your answer should make at least 2 points.

- 2. What part of the day does this scene take place?

HINT: The question tells us to explain the meaning of words in bold which means we should define them using our own words.

- a. 'costs a "small mortgage"'
- b. 'heavily **tinted** windows'
- c. 'The hand **dangled** there'

HINT: 'Identify' means to find, and 'quote' means we need to include exact words from the passage in our answer.
